Avoid CryptoLocker and other Scams

There are two actions all users should take. Firstly ensure you **backup** your valuable data, documents, spreadsheets, photos, audio etc, to separate media such as external hard drives, USB sticks etc.

Always **disconnect such devices** as soon as each backup is complete. Any device still attached, will be infected if the virus attacks.

Secondly, **never click on any suspect email or Internet link.**

Did You Know? Cameras that captured the Moon's surface for the first time were left there because of their weight.

The Moon serves as a cosmic graveyard for 12 Hasselblad cameras when astronauts abandoned them when leaving the Earth's satellite. These cameras shot iconic images of the Moon's surface and were left behind to allow for the 25kg of lunar rock samples to be carried back instead.
